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

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CNM Team Emerges Champion for Pitch It 2017.

A team consisting of Communications and New Media (CNM) students have emerged as the champion for Pitch It! 2017 after the grand finals held on November 10.

Pitch It! 2017 is a tertiary-wide marketing competition organized by the CNM Society. This year, Pitch It! was organized in collaboration with Visa Inc and BBDO.

The participating teams put together an integrated marketing campaign to address a challenge posed by Visa Inc.

After an elimination round, Visa Inc chose the top five teams who were then mentored by BBDO to refine their pitches.

The challenge posed by VISA was - "What can VISA do to shift brand perception from a credit card company to an innovative digital payment company amongst the Millennials?"

In their campaign, the teams had to feature a wearable that showcases Visa Inc's innovative digital payment capabilities.

The Winning Pitch

The winning pitch was a campaign titled #IAMVISA which aims to show how Visa can be a part of millennial's lifestyle. Their campaign was inspired by Calvin Klein's 2016 Fall #mycalvins campaign.

#IAMVISA features a playful take on VISA with each letter taking on a personality type - V for Versatile, I for Intellectual, S for Simplistic and A for Adventurous.

Phase One is a social media campaign featuring the different personality types to introduce #IAMVISA and act as a pretext for the next phase of the campaign.

Phase Two is a festival inspired by Art Box where attendees can pay using a temporary tattoo embedded with a VISA chip that flaunts VISA Inc's digital payment innovation.

The festival will be held across two weekends with each day featuring one personality type. Each personality type will be tied to a charity organisations and 10% of proceeds from the festival will be donated to these organisations.

Phase Three incorporates the different personality type into VISA cards with each card featuring a personality type.

The panel of judges consisting of personnel from CNM, VISA Inc and BBDO, unanimously chose the winning pitch. The judges were impressed with the cohesiveness of the winning team's multi-pronged approach, backed by insightful research.

The Champions

The winning team consists of Cory Cheang Yi Jun, Pang Hui Ping, Taylor Chia Shi-Yen, Isabelle Anastasia Tan Yinn Lyn and Alvarez Brielle Clavel. All of whom are in their second year.

"The greatest difficulty we faced was juggling between school work and the competition," said Cheang.

The champions walked away with an iPad mini 4 each.

The Organizers

Behind the success of Pitch It! 2017 is the CNM Society. Led by Jasmine Chong and Deanne Galicia, Pitch It! was the biggest project for the society.

The organizers faced setbacks initially with difficulty in securing partnerships with organisations. The partnership with Visa Inc was eventually secured with the help of an alumni.

"The competition was a year in the making. It was a huge undertaking! We reached out to many organisations and faced a lot of rejection. The real work hit us when we finally secured a partner client. From doing school visits to managing communications with all parties involved. We spent countless hours planning everything to the last detail. In the end, it was all worth it because we truly believe Pitch It! is an incredible learning experience. Even [the planning committee] learnt a lot about marketing!" said Chong.

Pitch It! 2018 is under way and the planning has already begun. For the next edition, the CNM Society is looking to tap into the Institute of Public Relations Singapore and CNM's Industry Advisory Council to find a partner client.

More about Pitch It! 2017

Pitch It! 2017 is the third edition of the competition. Past clients include SPH and Mediacorp.

This year, students from National University of Singapore, Nanyang Technological University, Singapore Management University, Singapore University of Social Sciences, Temasek Polytechnic, Singapore Polytechnic, Nanyang Polytechnic and General Assembly participated in the competition. There were 23 teams and a total of 107 participants.


PDF Viewer. (for editing PDFs- highlight, scribble notes and draw!)

What is school without IVLE-downloaded readings and textbooks? If you're someone who likes to scribble on your notes, PDF Viewer can make the experience so much easier- and more artsy too.

Its functions include a font colour wheel that lets you adjust the colour, opacity and thickness of your pen/highlighter, shapes, lines, text boxes, image pasting etc. You can also have an overview of all pages in List view, and Bookmark important pages. Laborious and boring reading begone!



Postermy wall or Canva.






(for notetaking, organising, font designing- and even birthday card making!)




OneNote is basically an online notebook - but better. With organising functions that let you categorise your notes into subjects, pages and chapters, and a wide variety of pens, fonts, brushes, highlighter and pen colours that far exceed the Co-op's selection, notetaking will be a breeze.



Forget GDocs, notetaking doesn't have to run vertically. You can write in text boxes, then MOVE them up horizontally - or anywhere you want them. There are no margins or borders in One Note, so if you prefer seeing things side by side, close together, or just all over the place, this is your app. You can add images in, copy-paste diagrams from lecture notes, or draw your own models too.

YONG TAU FOO & LAKSA

Having won the Yummiest Food Outlet (Canteen Category), Best Service Star (Canteen Category) and Healthiest Food Outlet Awards in 2015, it's no surprise that this stall is popular among seniors, freshmen and staff.

Although the ingredients may be standard, the star of the show is definitely still their Laksa Gravy, which is what most people head down for. However if you want something lighter, their regular soup base is pretty refreshing too.

With prices beginning from as low as \$2.20, it's no surprise why queues snake so long during lunchtime. In our opinion, this stall is absolutely worth the wait, and definitely getting the most out of your buck! Head down early though, most of the popular ingredients sell out pretty early in the day!

CHICKEN RICE

If a quick takeout option is all you need, the chicken rice stall makes a convenient choice. Each plate of chicken rice comes with a fragrant plate of rice, a decent serving of chicken and soup on the side. If the portion is too little, it doesn't cost much to top up extra meat!

A standard box of roasted breast meat with rice costs \$2.30, however if you're looking to add on some roasted pork and egg, it's still pretty affordable at \$3.

JAPANESE STALL

The Japanese stall sells a variety of dishes, having the option of both rice and noodles. The best part of the Japanese stall is definitely how big the portions can get! The Oyako Don has quite a big serving of rice, and a generous helping of egg and chicken. If you're looking for a soupy option on a rainy day, give their udon and soba a try too.

Dishes are priced from \$3.50 onwards, and you can be sure you're getting enough ingredients for what you're paying for.

Reedz @ NUS Shaw Foundation Alumni House

Long before the Spread at Biz school opened, there was Reedz, which drew long queues and raved reviews over its savory mains. Now, to our delight, we hear that Reedz has just opened their new outlet right next to Biz and Deck at the NUS Shaw Foundation Alumni Guild House.

Reedz serves mainly café fare ranging from pastas and grilled chicken, to pastries, coffees and muffins. Prices are affordable, ranging from \$4-\$7. Our favorite item on the menu was the Casadias (mainly the Mexican Beef with feta cheese option), as well as their muffins which was moist and delectable with every bite.

The location is also nice and quiet with charging points and a good view, making it quite a conducive place for project meetings and studying.

Liang Ban Kung Fu @ Upperdeck

Mala below \$10 is reason enough for one to pay Liang Ban Kung Fu at the upperdeck a visit, but the affordable price isn't the only bonus—the Mala served by them is also exceptionally shiok and tasty.

For those who are unaware, Mala is a popular Sichuan dish that has taken Singapore by storm. The joy of eating it comes from its shiok-esque spiciness that keeps you wanting more, and the ingredients are entirely up to your choice.

The mala stall at upperdeck offers a wide selection of meat, seafood, vegetables and noodles and its spicy level comes in 3 forms: small, medium and high. For those who are afraid of spiciness, the "small" choice is a good start with a tolerable spice level that still lets you enjoy the mala.

We recommend choosing the fish for its tenderness, enoki and oyster mushrooms for its all-round goodness, and lotus roots for that extra crunch. This meal will not only be wallet-friendly, but a filling and satisfying one at that.

Another pocket friendly café, would be the Platypus Food Bar tucked within the Faculty of Science, S16. If you are ever at a lost for what cuisine you are craving for, fret not, this place got you covered. 
The Coffee Roaster @ AS8

Follow the scent of freshly brewed coffee wafting through the new AS8 building in Arts and you'll find yourself at The Coffee Roaster. Run astonishingly, by an NUS student himself and his mother, the coffee joint is the result of their passion for good coffee.

True to their word, their coffee has led to a steady stream of NUS students and staff going in and out of their shop every day. While The Coffee Roaster offers quite the selection of drinks, the Iced Mocha and Caramel Macchiato is one of the more standout options (if you like your coffee to be on the sweeter side), otherwise, the standard latte will never go wrong.

Yong Tau Foo @ Utown Foodclique

You've heard of Deck's famous Yong Tau Foo, but have you heard of Utown's? That's right, this unassuming stall located in Foodclique impressed us so much that it might just seem like the better Yong Tau Foo to queue for...

In terms of variety, Utown's Yong Tau Foo stall offers a lot more choices than Deck's. There are options such as cheese tofu, enoki mushrooms, pork dumplings, corn, and many more that will leave you deliberating over which to choose for their minimum amount of 6 items. This alone, is a plus point over the relatively little choices we have over at Deck side.

Soup and noodle wise, the Utown stall offers the similar choice of Dry, Soup or Laksa. However, their variety of noodle is slightly more extensive than Deck's, with choices like Guo tiao mian or Mee Sua as well. If you like changing up your options a little once in a while, you will certainly enjoy this benefit here.

The defining factor for us, however, is the fact that Utown's Yong Tau Foo bothers to fry your ingredients on the side so that it doesn't get thrown into the soup and become a soggy mess. The seaweed chicken and cheese tofu we ordered was served in a separate bowl from our soup noodles and was crispy to the bite. This is something we never see over at Deck's Yong tau foo stall despite it being so popular.

If these are not enough to appeal to you, did we also mention that a bowl will only cost a total of \$3.50? Next time you're in Utown, make sure to give foodclique's Yong Tau Foo stall a try—we'll leave you to decide for yourself which is the better one ;)
